The Reign of the Queen Archetype:

Above and Below, Around and Within, Life and Death – She Rules

Presentation: The Queen archetype is an eternal and all-encompassing dynamism and pattern embedded in nature, the cosmos, the heavens, and the underworld, and a living feminine principle in the human psyche. She provides a psychic conduit regulating the experiences of suffering, loss, diminishment, and death, while preserving the potential for future development. She is the feminine face of God, a binding property that ultimately upholds the tension of the opposites, bringing the unconscious and conscious into union or cooperation. Patriarchal dominance, egocentrism, and disorder are on the loose. In the absence of a conscious relationship with the Queen Archetype, we can fall into oblivion, rage, dissolution. As we love her, trust her, and ask for her guidance, she rises again with regulation, compassion, balance, and wholeness.

Dionysus and Ariadne – An Ancient Myth for Modern Times

Presentation: Ariadne is the yin to the yang of the god Dionysus. He is called the 'Great Loosener' and 'Underworld Sun,' and she the 'Mistress of the Labyrinth.' They come together as a pair of opposites. They are the energy of life force, reveal unity in contradictions: wholeness through dissolution, life in the underworld, reason in the irrational, peace in the frenzy, and the power of the body. They suggest to us that to fully live, one must embrace these contradictions. And they suggest that this requires recognition of the Other, because the Other is a portal into the mystery. In her lecture, Nancy would like to explore the redemptive themes found in this ancient Greek myth, that might help guide us through the labyrinth of these chaotic times.

Evolution, Neuropsychology, and Jungian Theory:

Contributions Toward the Study of Archetypes, Dreams and the Transcendent function

Presentation: In the years since Jung's death, substantial progress has been made in the study of evolution, which supports the theory of archetypes, and in neuropsychology, specifically as related to split-brain phenomena that emphasize differences between the left and right hemispheres of the brain and provide a possible context for at least some aspects of the psychology of dreaming and of other psychological phenomena, such as the transcendent function. This presentation will review three Jungian theoretical concepts to illustrate possible evolutionary and neuropsychological influences related to them. These concepts are: 1) the theory of archetypes, 2) the interpretation of dreams, and 3) the transcendent function.

The Magic Drum

Presentation: One of the contemporary fears is still a fear of the unknown, ultimately leading to the ego's fear of being undone, unraveled, extinguished, erased. The presented Inuit folktale describes a situation of this sort—a person is undone. The message from the folktale brings us back to a fundamental truth—the healing comes from the unconscious. In the tale, we find many opposites, such as: waiting-doing; living-dying; old-young; alone-in the group; masculine-feminine; inner-outer; material-spiritual. Only by holding the tension and by being in accordance with the unconscious renewal of life occurs.
